

An update from your hospice this Christmas

Christmas is one of those periods in the year that give many of us pause for thought, the opportunity to reflect on the last year, spend time with loved ones and feel the absence of those no longer with us. As a hospice, this has been the first year since 2019 that hasn't been dominated by covid and although the acute phase is thankfully over, the long shadow of the pandemic has left a legacy that we will be confronting for many more years to come.

At the forefront of my thoughts is the seemingly permanent change in the demographic using our inpatient services with younger people now much greater in number than previously. In time we'll have official data, but there is little doubt in my mind that the delays in diagnosis and treatment during lockdown is a direct contributor to this change and is seems unlikely the challenges our partners in the NHS are facing will be resolved any time soon. As a hospice, we are doing all that we can to make our services welcoming, making it accessible for younger people, and thinking too about those with young families and what more we can do to support children and other loved ones experiencing the devastation of trauma, loss and bereavement.

This sits on top of what we know is increasing demand for palliative and end of life care. With its energy, community, history and iconic landscapes, it can be easy to overlook the long-term health problems many Teessiders face. As a hospice, we want to be there for everybody who can benefit from our care. But a peculiarity of NHS funding has always meant that specialist palliative and end of life care, what many would consider the very foundation of a caring society, has always relied heavily on charitable funding and donations for its support. In the face of rapidly increasing costs, this year finally saw MPs uniting and the government amending the law to change this anomaly. As your local hospice, we have been campaigning hard to make sure this brings much needed and lasting change to our area.



Progress has been painfully slow, but with clear law and statutory guidance. I am confident that in years to come, hospices like ours, that started the year with a large financial deficit, will be able to gradually expand the services they offer, and help more people and family affected by terminal illness.

The NHS will never cover all of the costs associated with hospice care, and for the next few years at least, we have to fundraise for around 70% of the costs of delivering the care many people assume is already paid for. Our remarkable community of fundraisers, donors and supporters have worked tirelessly again by running events, charity shops, challenges, corporate sponsorships and more. As always, I've been bowled over by how just much our community values its hospice, and the money raised has enabled us to care for many hundreds of people and families who need the specialist-level hospice care that isn't available elsewhere. To each and every one of you please accept my thanks and gratitude. I know how difficult times are right now for many people, and your support is something we truly value and never take for granted.

On a personal note, this will be my last Christmas at Teesside Hospice. After five years in the role of Chief Executive, its time for me to move on to pastures new in the spring. Working at Teesside Hospice has been an enormous privilege, and given me the ability to see, every single day, families like my own who needed hospice care and got it because of the team here. In my book that's priceless, and something that will stay with me for the rest of my life.

"My name's Sarah, I'm only from down the road, but I ended up coming to Teesside Hospice because I've got cancer. I suffered a lot with the pain, especially in my back and stomach. But, with the help of these guys, through pain management I've got control of my life back."

Whilst staying in our 10-bed inpatient unit, you have access to 24-hour specialist care in a comfortable and relaxed environment. A real home from home, where the needs of our patients come first. We will do everything we can to make their stay is just as they would like it to be. You'll always have control of your care plan, and the reassurance of a nurse call system with nurses available 24 hours per day, and a doctor available on call.

"There's just a stigma there, and I was one of them who believed in that stigma. I come through the door and after a few days, I just realised how much I was wrong about the words 'Teesside Hospice'. If I could make all the people understand what it's like, I would.

I'm actually smiling, and I've never had a smile on my face in a long time. I spent three days pacing around my room. I didn't want to go outside the doors. I was in too much pain. I'm a very anxious person, so for me to try and go out them doors, and have other people see me in pain, it's just not going to happen. It's why I spent the last year in bed where I could just suffer in silence, and without having anyone look at me – including my kids."

At Teesside Hospice, we want people to live life until the end of life. Everybody gets treated as an individual, whether it's physical, mental or emotional support they need from us. So, they can stay as independent as possible, for as long as possible.

"Now I'm starting to feel like a new me. I can hardly believe it. I've gone out and I've been talking to everyone. I've just been so joyous to be back in the real world. It's all thanks to Teesside Hospice because it's something I couldn't have done at home by myself."

"Craig struggled as well. He was struggling with me, and I think it gets him down a lot as well because he spent a lot of time with me and didn't dare leave my side in case something happened. It's not fair. I kept on saying to him: 'I feel like I'm a burden on you', because he's got a car, he could go anywhere he wants, but he was just sticking by my side. So hopefully now, Craig might feel like he can wander away from me and do something by himself."

A terminal illness not only impacts the individual, but their families too. We're here to offer support and guidance to families, during and after someone's terminal illness.

"The support that they have given me has been round-the-clock. I woke up one morning and I started having a bad cough, they came running in straight away. I'd have struggled with that at home, and Craig would've started getting anxious. It was so good to have someone there on-hand.

It's the little things that you take for granted that they're there for, and it really makes a difference.

Sarah is 1 of 2,000 local people we support each year across all services. Without the support from you, we couldn't give Sarah the much-needed care that she deserves.

"This place isn't fully government funded so I do have to say a massive thank you to those who can help and can contribute to something like this. To anyone who donates or fundraises to help people like me come to a place like this – thank you. I wouldn't be here, and I wouldn't have gotten the help I needed if it wasn't for Teesside Hospice."



Barbara's Story

I support the Light up a Life campaign in memory of my son Paul. We had the heartbreak of losing him when he was just 14 months old, just as he was beginning to show his personality and his cheekiness.

My husband David and I married in our early twenties and have been together nearly 60 years. For years we tried to start a family. The stress was getting to me that my doctor told me to forget about it, and go on holiday, which we did and ironically, and I came back pregnant.

Paul was a canny little thing. I always carry his photo with me in my purse because his smile brought so much joy to people. We would go out to the shops, and everyone would have their head in the pram talking to him, he was that type of baby, he loved everyone. Paul would've been celebrating his 50th birthday this year and I often sit and wonder what he might've looked like, what job he would've done, if I'd have had grandchildren.

When we went to register Paul's death, I thought: 'was it something I did, was it something I didn't notice? Why my child? Why me?' I'll carry those what if's' forever.

My dad had died the year before, and the day he died, Paul then died a year to that day. In the book of remembrance in the crematorium, their names are on the same page. My dad's name is at the top of the page, and Paul's name is at the bottom. Quite bittersweet really, my dad's name looking down on my son.

A few months after Paul died, a young girl a few doors down gave birth to premature twins, and one died. I posted a card through her door just to tell her that I knew how she felt and if she needed to talk to somebody. A while after, she came over to the house and told me how much she appreciated me reaching out to her, and how it made her feel to know someone else had gone through the same thing. Losing a child is something you'll never get over and never forget. Death isn't easy, it's difficult, but you learn to walk alongside it.

We have been supporters of the hospice for many years. We have supported the Light up a life campaign since it began. From placing baubles on the Christmas trees to dedicating a star in Paul's memory to place on the Christmas trees. I am happy that my husband and I can continue to support Light up a Life while supporting a local charity who dedicates so much time and does such great work.

I was never able to buy Paul presents at Christmas, so to me, supporting Light up a Life is my way of buying him a Christmas present, while donating to a charity who need it.

"My husband passed away in 2006, he was cared for by the hospice's Lymphoedema Clinic. Then ten years later, in 2016, my daughter Tracy passed away in the hospice. She was only 52. She stayed there a couple of days, but she was so happy to be there. I would stay all day when i used to visit. She left me with three wonderful grandchildren who I have supported through university.

When you lose someone, the milestones in life mean more to you, especially when they're not here to celebrate them.

I have supported the hospice for many years, even before Tracy died. I regularly give £5 a month, as well as buy raffle tickets and send a donation at Christmas. I try and do what I can because for somewhere like this, every little bit helps. My dad used to say to me 'All the pennies make a pound'.

I don't think people realise how wonderful it is in here. They look after everyone so well, and then when Tracy died, the nurses told me to come back tomorrow morning, and the way they prepared her room and had her laid was lovely. The support you get is not just before, it's after too."


